## Village Show

This is our biggest event of the year. It will be held on Saturday 27th August. As usual, set up on Friday evening and that is when the Village Show group appreciate all the help they can get!
This year we have pleasure in introducing a new trophy for the children to win. This will be called the John Done Flora \& Fauna Trophy. The winner will be selected by the Primary School who has shown the most appreciation of the fauna and flora of the region in the form of artwork or in the support of our natural heritage.

Village Show - 2022: Saturday 27th August, 2 PM This year's theme, consistent with the theme of local shows throughout the UK is "Jubilee". There will be an exhibition of village produce, home crafts, floral, art, photography and baking.
We hope that the villagers as well as the many new comers to the village will participate, with particular emphasis on the children.

They can all look forward to our ever popular raffle and auction... and much, much more. Prize Giving of the following trophies will be at $3.20 \mathrm{pm} .$. they include the Bob Cubin Cup for the overall show winner with the most points gained from all categories; the Maureen Trotter Cup for the best Fruit and Vegetables; and the Jubilee Cup for the overall winner in the Children's section. For the best pot plant, the Connie Dennison Cup, and the SWRI Cup for the best home baking entry.

## Children's Classes
